Read this transcript of a powerfully important interview. Nadia Oweidat is a Jordanian-American scholar and researcher and she makes some profoundly important statements including the following:

"... delving into this research, I really wonder how much of the negative opinion [in the Middle East] now is actually authentic or organic, and how much of it is, in fact, directed—directed by authoritarian forces within the region and outside the region. And I am not really sure that a lot of these grievances are actually grassroots. In fact, what I'm seeing is that there are investments being made to voices that focus solely on everything negative about the West, the United States, liberal values, and democracy."

"No matter how good an idea is, if we don't support it and there is instead support for an idea that is much worse, you know which one is going to rule the day."

"We need to really take that war of ideas seriously."

She is refreshingly correct and this short discussion reminds all of us the importance of waging the narrative war (or the war of ideas) intelligently and competently. She implies that the U.S. government does not do either and she seems to wonder why as if the U.S. government had done better in an earlier period. It hadn't.

What changed is that in the earlier period (pre-2001), the U.S. located media establishment told the story of the benefits that come from a free, open, liberal, and diverse society. U.S. movies and television into the 1990s told stories of the goodness and greatness of America and the American system specifically, and Western ideals more broadly. It is important to remember that in the late 1980s the most popular television show in South Africa as well as America was about a black American doctor and his family – *The Cosby Show*. That was amazing and had to have an impact in the narrative war against Apartheid.

The U.S. government will fail in the narrative war so long as it is in direct competition with the media produced and promulgated from its own territory.

Narratives, and I believe narrative war, starts domestically. American success with its global narrative was not a result of American foreign diplomacy nor was it because of the USIA. It was because America believed that it was the best nation on earth. It was comfortable with itself. When I say America, I mean American government, American industry, and American media. The world loved America because it saw it through the eyes of Frank Capra, John Ford, and dozens of other Hollywood directors, actors, musicians, and sports stars; each of whom acted and portrayed an America that was great, comparatively.

The comparatively matters. The message that has infused American culture since the Vietnam War has been one of failure, corruption, and falsehood. America has been degraded by the same categories of voices who lionized it as Emerald City with the Great and Powerful Oz as a little old man greedily pulling levers and barking orders from behind a curtain. Neither message was nor is accurate. America has and had flaws, some of

which were significant, but at no point has America's flaws been equal to those of its competitors. Both Russia and China are significantly more corrupt, racist, and flawed than America ever has been on its worst day.

As we seek to make America better, which it should and needs to be, we need to communicate to the world that it is still the comparatively best country in the world. No one is traveling hundreds or thousands of miles to get into China or Russia. That should mean something.

People need to recognize that global power is comparative. The choice for the globe isn't a perfect order or a corrupt American one. The choice is an imperfect American order or a deeply flawed and dangerous Chinese one. That isn't a choice anyone outside of China should ever contemplate. What Secretary Gates calls for will only work when the plethora of American voices will again be expressing the goodness that is America. Only then will Public Diplomacy be effective in amplifying what the world is already hearing.

This is brilliant because it is simple, and it is correct. To do this properly, we need to do our homework with respect to recognizing the needs and the cognitive dissonance that exist between what people believe they should have and what they do have. That is what generates the need. The network is the trusted agents that the person or group connect with and will listen to and adjust their behavior accordingly. The narrative (story) is the way that the call to action is being transmitted. Simple and complete.

The biggest challenge for practitioners is getting this all in the correct context.

This has been on my to-read list for many weeks. It is worth reading for several reasons: the clarification of the meaning of propaganda, the correction of the distinction between information warfare and narrative warfare, and most importantly the emphasis on the importance of education in the narrative warfare in which we are engaged.

While I agree that the military should not be in the education business, I fear that academia is both incapable of providing and an adversary to the education that needs to occur. It isn't enough to teach people how to

learn or to be critical thinkers about and, more importantly, critical consumers of information. People need to be aware of the meaning of the message being expressed. Academia, writ large, is happy for anti-Western and anti-American messaging to be present in media. One does not need to agree with specific policies to recognize that Western and, specifically, American ideals and values have created the greatest advances in human development and flourishing. One can both be a proponent for improvements in behavior and policy while at the same time championing the systems that provided the life and lifestyle facilitating the critical environment. Modern Western and American academic institutions are, I fear, incapable of doing this. There are a few exceptions and at least one new institution being created that may provide hope, but I do not believe they are sufficient for the education envisioned in this article and necessary for the transformation needed.

So, what is to be done? I don't know, yet. What I think at the moment is that the education needs to come from outside the existing institutional model.

Scheff's (1994) "feeling trap" might be such a system, in which being ashamed about not retaliating for injury makes us angry about being shamed, which makes us shamed for not retaliating, and so forth, in "a self-perpetuating loop of intensely painful feelings" (260)

Any prolonged emotional response is, by definition, a distortion of biobehavioral adaptation, and, as in the case of chronic anxiety, it may have the potential to create a disordered state of mind that affects normal judgment and function. When humiliation occurs on a group level, there may be so many events occurring over so many years that the experience becomes chronic, and that may be a factor in the special fury that is sometimes found in asymmetric group conflicts. (262)

groups with a culture of honor should feel more shame and more humiliation after failure to retaliate. (262)

This symmetry makes humiliation the prototypical emotional experience of asymmetric conflict. (263)

Regardless of the veracity of the allegations this is the type of narrative warfare that is warned by those who talk about the attention economy. Present and future conflict will, in part, be dominated by unprovable charges and allegations. Leaders will be distracted by a near constant barrage of such things. Attention will be diverted to prevent the actor from focusing on the conflict.

That said, the US Army needs to know what its story is. To a degree it needs to understand what its identity is. It can't get caught in a counternarrative struggle. It needs to explain what it is to the American populace and to the world. I think the new ad campaign was a great start, but such a campaign is only a delivery mechanism. The US Army needs to be what the commercial claimed that it was and is. That needs to be demonstrated on the gunnery ranges, the maneuver areas, and in classrooms. That performance needs to then be shown to the world through global communication as well as humanitarian and conflict actions so that it is clear.

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Narratives are delivered through stories and those stories are sometimes promulgated or attacked through messages and memes which can be made up of specific words and phrases. Allahu Akbar is one such phrase that has become a powerful meme in both promoting and combatting terrorism. This brief opinion piece expresses what this phrase means to Muslims around the world – a benign reference to the power and greatness of God. For us to understand the power of narrative we also need to understand the means of transmitting, magnifying, and transforming narratives through memes, messages, and stories. In the case of Allahu Akbar, the meaning of the meme, message, story, and narrative seems clear to many who report and comment on the news – it is a declaration of Islamic terrorism. This simplistic reading of a deeply influential and powerful phrase in a global religion with more than a billion adherents requires more depth and greater appreciation if we are to win through maneuver in the narrative space. We need to build our own positive narrative with supporting stories, messages, and memes that promotes who we are and what we want to accomplish rather than focusing solely on countering the poisonous narrative of the opponent. Countering the poison is important, but it is not the whole, nor even, the most important part of this fight.

We can put a stake through the heart of Islamic State as an army. We can put a stake through the heart of its leaders. You can take away its territory. But you can't put a stake through the heart of the ideas, of the ideology, that sadly, tragically, still has some attraction for some small numbers in the Islamic faith.

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## **Fighting ISIS in Iraq**

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This is a powerful article capturing just a few of the critical issues with capturing Mosul from ISIS. One should expect that the Iraqi security forces have taken thousands of casualties thus far as the only UN published

number approached 2,000 more than a month ago. The problem is that the lead units are those units that are least sectarian and best positioned to help govern the country in a reasonable way following the fighting and now they are being bled white. There were several reasons the US should have encouraged a delay on the fighting in Mosul and this article identifies two: casualties in crucial elements of the ISF and the suffering and eventual issues with starvation and cholera.

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Good food for thought. These are not really new questions, but continuations of the discussion on what are the U.S. interests in Syria. The questions are: 1) How long will Washington back Syrian rebel fighters? 2) What's Trump's plan if Russia/Assad advances? 3) What is the roadmap to peace and who is in charge of it? 4) Where are the Saudis and Gulf states?

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The single best discussion of the consequences of the fighting in Raqqa.

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I am torn by this article. I hate it and I think that it has tremendous value. Let me explain why. First, I hate it for three reasons:

- The article is late to the discussion. Some of us have been arguing that killing human beings with drones during the global war on terror was wrong for more than 10 years. It would have been nice if *The New York Times* had used its significant media clout to wage this fight during the Obama administration when it would have mattered. This article is like criticizing referees by using a recorded game.
- 2. The article gives the impression that special operators are heartless or without compassion, which is, at best, a caricature of the complexity of the environment in which the fighting happened.
- 3. In connection with number 2, the article demonstrates little effort to name those senior leaders who had responsibility for this fight people wearing stars.

Second, I feel the article has value for three reasons (yes, I am going for symmetry here).

- 1. War is complex. The fighting in Syria made most previous wars look very simple by comparison. The examples used in the article are often caricatures of how specific people responded to the complexity (see #2 above). How should a person respond to that complexity in terms of fighting ISIS in a complex networked environment with limited on the ground intelligence, but lots of contact and friendly casualties? Additionally, both in Syria and Iraq it was difficult to get partner forces to move forward without displays of American firepower. The actions identified in the article seem callused, but they may have been necessary. War is hell. That must never be forgotten, lest we enter it too easily.
- 2. We need to train U.S. military personnel much better on the local culture and environment so that they can read the signs provided by the technical marvels of the modern world. This article demonstrates the risks and costs when we fail to provide that training, even to the very best special operators.
- 3. Drone warfare was wrong and should have been stopped. Articles like this are essential to making this point public. I hope a lot of people read it for that reason.

Based off "an intensive multi-week planning exercise to frame, design, and evaluate potential courses of action that the United States could pursue to defeat the threat from the Islamic State in Iraq and al Sham (ISIS) and al Qaeda in Iraq and Syria.... This second report will define American strategic objectives in Iraq and Syria, identify the minimum necessary conditions for ending the conflicts there, and compare U.S. objectives with those of Iran, Russia, Turkey, and Saudi Arabia in order to understand actual convergences and divergences. The differences mean that the U.S. cannot rely heavily on international partners to achieve its objectives."

The key findings of this second report are:

• The U.S. must accomplish four strategic objectives in Iraq and Syria to achieve vital national interests and secure its people: 1) destroy enemy groups; 2) end the communal, sectarian civil wars; 3) set conditions to prevent the reconstitution of enemy groups; and 4) extricate Iraq and Syria from regional and global conflicts.

• Any American strategy must take urgent measures to strengthen Iraqi Prime Minister Abadi and prepare contingency efforts for his fall. The collapse of the Abadi government and return of his predecessor Nuri al Maliki would be disastrous for the fight against ISIS.

• Ongoing international negotiations within the Vienna Framework are bypassing essential requirements for long-term success in Syria. Re-establishing a stable, unitary Syrian state that secures American interests requires the U.S. and its partners to 1) destroy ISIS, Jabhat al Nusra, and foreign Salafi-jihadi groups in Syria; 2) identify and strengthen interlocutors representing the Syrian opposition; 3) facilitate a negotiated settlement between the Syrian regime and opposition; 4) obtain regional acceptance of that settlement; 5) establish peace-enforcement mechanisms; and 6) reconstruct state institutions.

• The Salafi-jihadi militant base in Syria poses a threat to the U.S., but the U.S. must not simply attack it because that would put the U.S. at war with many Sunnis who must be incorporated into a future, post-Assad inclusive government. The U.S. must separate reconcilable from irreconcilable elements. These other Salafi-jihadi groups must meet the following conditions essential for core U.S. security objectives in order to participate: 1) break with Jabhat al Nusra and ISIS; 2) accept the principle of a future pluralistic and unitary Syrian state; 3) reject violent jihad; 4) commit to disarming to a policing and defensive level; 5) and commit to the elimination of the current shari'a court system and the establishment of political institution-based governance.

• The superficial convergence of Iranian, Russian, Turkish, and Saudi strategic objectives with those of the U.S. on ISIS as a threat masks significant divergences that will undermine U.S. security requirements. Iran and Russia both seek to reduce and eliminate U.S. influence in the Middle East and are not pursuing strategies that will ultimately defeat al Qaeda and ISIS in Syria or Iraq. Turkey's support for the Muslim Brotherhood and other Islamist groups, some linked to al Qaeda, stem from the ruling party's intent to reestablish itself as an independent, Muslim, regional power. Finally, Saudi Arabia's objectives remain shaped by perceived existential threats from Iran and a growing succession crisis, causing key divergences, especially over support to Salafi-jihadi groups. The U.S. must lead efforts to resolve the crisis in Syria and cannot outsource them to partners.

Rukmini Callimachi has provided some of the best reporting on ISIS over the last year. This article is another excellent example of her work. She has shown the complexity of life in the ISIS caliphate. The people living under ISIS governance were not making a choice between a Western Utopia and Mad Max Fury Road. In many ways ISIS provided greater stability and predictability for residents than did the state leadership it replaced. This is important in expressing some of what needs to be done for opponents of ISIS to provide a better alternative. It isn't enough to kill ISIS and drive them out. The new governance needs to be at least as honest and just as was the caliphate. That may sound like a low bar, but unfortunately it has proven to be harder to clear than many think. Rukmini Callimachi's reporting is critical to gaining an understanding of life in the caliphate so that current state leaders know the actual height of the bar that they have to clear.

The author provides an excellent summary of issues associated with failed apocalyptic prophecies of ISIS. The one point not fully raised in the article is that to a true believer these prophecies have not failed – they just have not yet been realized. There is a profound difference. Unlike most of the groups that are used as examples in the article, ISIS did not give a date for events to happen nor did ISIS name a specific person to a specific date- or event-connected title or position. ISIS references to Dabiq and the battle to happen there were not essential to the group's narrative. For that true believer, the battle will still happen. The prophecies still support the fact that the Roman-Crusaders will arrive and occupy Dabiq first and then the army of the righteous will arrive to fight them. It could still happen this way. These points are important for readers to understand when appreciating the resonance and attachment of the ISIS narrative for true believers.

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One of my favorite bosses regularly uttered my most hated phrase from my 26 years of uniformed service – "widen your aperture." I most often heard that phrase after I criticized something the U.S. military or

government was doing in Iraq. At the time, we both worked in Baghdad for a three-star general. I had served in the Middle East, at that point, for more than six years. I though my aperture was wide – wider than most U.S. officers and, I thought (and I still think) wider than that of my boss. My complaints were almost always about the short-sighted or culturally foolish decisions or actions of the U.S. government as it sought to implement some policy or in the process of departing Iraq as the conversations happened at the end of 2010 and into the first half of 2011.

The attached article offers a perspective of a former junior officer and his frustrations. Some might challenge that perspective for not having a wide enough aperture. I think that such an approach is wrong. If our policies do not make sense to those who actually have to implement them then the problem is the policy and not the perspective. Widening or narrowing the aperture shouldn't alter the efficacy of an objective. It is possible, in war, that a junior leader is told to attack a place with limited chance of success in order to facilitate success elsewhere along the line, but that should be built in to the orders issued. Soldiers, unlike fighters and warriors, are expected to follow orders out of disciplined obedience that may result in their death in pursuit of the higher unit's mission or objective.

So much of my GWOT frustration has been that the senior leaders haven't know what they were doing any more than those who questioned them. Rather than have the hard conversations that might promote collective widening of perspective apertures, such efforts were closed down as the junior leader was told his or her perspective was inaccurate and if he or she had the proper perspective all things would become clear and comprehensible. That was not true ten years ago and it isn't true today.

Al-Hol is a combination displaced person and prison camp that at one point had more than 70,000 people in it. It has housed tens of thousands for well more than five years now to include men, but mostly women and children. The children are being raised without proper education or anything that can be called education at all. There is no opportunity for proper health care, exercise, or development of skills. It is a prison with essentially no hope of opportunity. This is a recipe for long-term disaster.

Because of the size and the lack of anything called policing, violence is a way of life that includes theft, extortion, assault, battery, and murder. The environment is dominated by those with extreme views and objectives.

This needs a solution, or we will all pay as these children grow up and take out their frustrations and anger on the world.

The title is salacious. The subject is important. The article is old, but as I have said, it has been in my inbox for ten months and deserved earlier treatment but is getting it now.

I have been talking about the repercussions of how ISIS prisoners were handled for many years now. This article expresses the seriousness and commitment associated with the belief in and adherence to the caliphate as established by ISIS. Too many in the West have treated the caliphate with a certain disdain as if it weren't serious or even a real thing. The details in this article express the seriousness with which many people take the caliphate and the lengths to which they will go in expressing their dedication to it.

The article also illuminates something that is also overlooked – the role of women in this current commitment to jihad. ISIS and Hamas have numerous dedicated women. I expect that this extends to other groups to include Ansar Allah (Houthis), al-Qaeda, Hezbollah, Taliban, Boko Haram, and others. Note that many of the pro-Hamas demonstrations in Western cities have been led by women or that women are the most prominent voices. The role of women in what can be labeled as religious extremism is critical to understand. Too often women have been portrayed as victims of the aforementioned groups. This article and numerous others like it express that women are not just victims. Some women are central to the growth and promulgation of the ideology.

For those who no longer believe ISIS to be a topic worthy of their time, I would suggest that the role of women in supporting and then regenerating Hamas will also be important and may bear similar traits to the lengths gone by women in support of ISIS. Some members of this online echo chamber eventually make the leap from keyboard warriors to actual militancy.
- American ISIS sympathizers are particularly active on Twitter, where they spasmodically create accounts that often get suspended in a never-ending cat-and-mouse game. Some accounts (the "nodes") are the generators of primary content, some (the "amplifiers") just retweet material, others (the "shout-outs") promote newly created accounts of suspended users.
- ISIS-related radicalization is by no means limited to social media. While instances of purely web-driven, individual radicalization are numerous, in several cases U.S.-based individuals initially cultivated and later strengthened their interest in ISIS's narrative through face-to-face relationships. In most cases online and offline dynamics complement one another.
- The spectrum of U.S.-based sympathizers' actual involvement with ISIS varies significantly, ranging from those who are merely inspired by its message to those few who reached mid-level leadership positions within the group

Abstract. This study addresses three questions: 1. What are the objectives of the leaders of ISIL? 2. What are the objectives of the followers of ISIL? 3. How are the two sets of objectives related?

To answer these questions, we analyzed the transcripts of interviews and presentations of 59 subject matter experts (SMEs) and conducted a separate analysis of speeches of ISIL leaders and selected Internet sources. In both efforts we identified and structured the strategic, fundamental, and means objectives of ISIL and its followers. The results indicate that ISIL's leaders pursue four strategic objectives: (1) Establish a Caliphate in Iraq and the Levant, (2) Control and Govern the Caliphate, (3) Expand Islam and Sharia Law Worldwide, and (4) Recreate the Power and Glory of (Sunni) Islam. The followers' objectives can be partitioned into three strategic objectives: Humanitarian Fulfillment, Religious Fulfillment, and Personal Fulfillment. The objectives identified from the SME interviews were similar to those identified from ISIL leaders' statements and the Internet. However, the Internet search revealed many more personal objectives of ISIL followers. The results further indicate that ISIL's leadership objectives are closely aligned with those of its followers. There also is a sharp contrast between the objectives of ISIL and those of Al Qaeda, particularly ISIL's emphasis on occupying and controlling territories in Iraq and Syria versus Al Qaeda's focus on worldwide jihad.

China's approach appears, on the surface, to be a better offer than that of the U.S. because it seems to be a no-strings-attached relationship. That is not true; China has many strings, and it also doesn't deliver the same quality product regardless of the nature of the product, but few leaders care, and the average citizen typically won't ever see the effect of the relationship down the road and China gets away with it.

Back in 2005 I was given the perspective that China is renting the U.S. Navy by buying American debt. In effect, this is true. China can do what it does globally because it is not responsible for securing any part of the global commons. That work is done primarily by the U.S. Navy and to a lesser degree the U.S. Air Force. China is a free rider on that security system and is enjoying the benefits of being able to put more money into the deliverables than to securing the lines of communication from source to destination.

Paul Cobaugh's comments on this article are more important than the article itself. I completely agree with the importance of understanding (actually and completely) the people who are the focus of an action, engagement, or policy. I disagree with the author's implication that policy makers pay attention to the tone and nuances of reporters. I don't believe that such reports actually shape policy at all. The problem, with respect to this article, in policy making is that so few of the people a policy maker trusts have the understanding the author is advocating. It isn't reporters who need to understand the local people (they probably need to, but their understanding won't make much of a difference) - it is the military, political, and policy professionals.

I agree with the emphasis on proper understanding of what I (and many others) call narrative space in the regions and countries where we engage. That understanding must be shared by many people. I hope that this article and others like it will challenge those who make decisions to do better framing of the problem set to

achieve a more complete and properly appreciated conceptualization of the problems trying to be solved.

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# **Other Players – Jordan**

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Part of narrative war is the use of history. Such use isn't controlled by or even connected to some form of objectively accurate history. In my 2014 book Bees and Spiders I recommend the importance of recognizing their history rather than real history to obtain cross-cultural influence. How a people, culture, or leader sees and interprets history is more important in the influence game than is any appreciation of objective history since it is their history that provides that shaping impetus in their narrative space. As someone who teaches history for a living, I must express the value in understanding, studying, and pursuing something that can be called objective or real history. The value of real history in cross-cultural or cross-narrative influence is that one can then appreciate just how much off the leader, culture, or people are and it may be possible to more effectively engage in the narrative war through such understanding.

The material in the article that follows identifies how Putin has selectively expressed Russian history. His selectivity expresses something about his narrative. I don't believe that Putin is ignorant of the repeated efforts and failures. I believe that he knows them all too well. I further believe that he is purposely emphasizing success to put the effort in perspective to express the value of suffering. The Russians suffered much in gaining Crimea and what is today Ukraine. They lost many battles. But, in the end, because they persevered, the Russians won. Putin is emphasizing the results of Russian perseverance and ability to endure suffering; he isn't hiding it. It is because of this perseverance that Russia will win now (according to Putin's narrative reinforcing stories) as it always had in the past.

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This is really a great article. Thanks Howard for sharing. There is so much that we do not even know or agree about when it comes to cyber crimes and cyber attacks. Is it warfare? When does it become war? Can one retaliate with physical violence when confronted by cyber violence? This is truly a staggering set of questions that we must address or unintended consequences could be devastating.

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What makes this article worthwhile is the discussion on the transformation of U.S. Army doctrine regarding information operations.

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This article argues that there is no Russian hybrid warfare. In fact, what we are observing is standard conventional warfare and a confused observer.

Responsible investment has often produced desirable results. See the Apollo program or the Marshall Plan as examples of success in such endeavors. You might add the Manhattan Project, but I would reject the B-29 program which was rife with cost overruns and other management problems.

The emphasis needs to be on the word responsible when we invest money in an endeavor. Support of Ukraine is morally right, and it is proper with respect to American national security. Though I disagree with those who criticize support for Ukraine as warmongering, I also agree with and understand their concerns about the efficacy of the support already provided and the seemingly feckless strategy being employed by all elements of the U.S. federal government.

What is the plan for victory? How will the investments already provided and being considered advance that plan? How is the strategic messaging and communication aiding the support and funding?

I fear that the current defense and national leadership do not understand the combinations necessary to wage and (more importantly) to win a narrative war. To be clear, the answer isn't more money.

I am concerned that this war will end badly for Ukraine as it becomes the first "Virtue Signal War." What I mean by the term virtue signal war is a war where people and states make bold pronouncements of support but do little with respect to action. I know that the United States has spent a lot of money on this war and that is a good thing, but nearly 32 years ago, we sent nearly three quarters of a million service members halfway around the world to defend and regain a small sheikhdom that few Americans had ever heard of.

The purpose of our commitment to Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm was to demonstrate to the world and global bullies that it is unacceptable for the Melian Dialogue to be enacted in the post-Cold War world.

It still amazes me that we haven't properly stood up and committed ourselves to expelling an invader and reestablishing the borders of a state, not in the Middle East or Africa or Southeast Asia, but very much a part of Europe. This is the place about which we developed the UN charter that informs the world that aggressive war is illegal and not to be tolerated. And, here the world and the United Nations sit and tolerate it. Stunning. Be informed and be aware.

I expect that we will be studying the reshaping of the globe as a consequence of this war for decades to come. I predicted that the war wasn't a forgone conclusion to be a defeat for Vladimir Putin in the early days and I fear that my predictions may be much more accurate than I wanted them to be.

I don't think the U.S. has had a workable and desirable message for the region for decades. The U.S. government makes the mistake of seeking counter-narrative efforts, but without a positive narrative. It criticizes local leaders without offering something manifestly better as an option. If one watches Al Jazeera news about the United States, I expect that America looks like a dystopian hellscape to the region. Why would that sell well?

China, on the other hand has success in the recent Winter Olympics and what appears to be wins all over the place. The Middle East doesn't care that China is a bully and a sort of global slumlord and that all of its

neighbors hate it. That is something they will only come to realize once the relationships are no longer beneficial and the relationships with China will always benefit those in power in small countries since China pays kickbacks better than does the West.

America's strength is its alliances. When we do it right, as we have done multiple times in our past, we are an actual partner. China doesn't have allies, nor does Russia. They have tributaries and subservient vassals. The U.S. has been a bad ally over most of the last two decades as it has variably criticized and publicly shamed our Middle East partners while demanding for its military forces free oil, free access, and unconstrained action from their sovereign territories.

My final point is about Afghanistan. The U.S. spent twenty years and it made the country worse and no one in government in DC (other than the SIGAR) admits as much. It isn't about the withdrawal though that was a visual reminder of U.S. incompetence; it was about the twenty years of failed policies; fraud, waste, and abuse; and general ignorance of the country - after twenty years. How could we still not know Afghanistan? I think that the regional players believe that Washington will never understand them, so why bother.

I completely disagree with the tone and many of the implications and assertions in this article. That said, the author has some real experience with policy in the Middle East and it is worth appreciating his perspective.

My disagreements include the following.

• Nations in the Middle East are not as inclined toward war with each other as the author suggests. They are very interested in fighting non-state actors and using non-state actors as proxies to fight other states, but that is not the same thing as what is being asserted. The states recognize the harm of state on state war and that is why it is being so assiduously avoided.

- Violence is a form of communication. The various actors are communicating and it is necessary communication. It is uncertain how this plays out, but artificially freezing the region through an imposed settlement will not resolve the issues any better than the current violence. It is sad for me to say as I love the region and the people who live there, but there needs to come a time when they are tired of killing each other. When that happens there will be peace.
- The Obama Administration did not know what it was doing in the Middle East any better than the current administration. My experience serving in multiple countries in the region during different presidential administrations taught me how little Washington DC, under every administration, understands the Middle East.

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This is a really good article on the relationship between soldier and state and links Roman military professionalism with today's professionalization.

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I apologize for sending this out more than seven months after publication, but I am going through my email inbox to clean things up and this was in there. It is excellent! Read it. It isn't long. There is a video link in the blog that is worth connecting to and watching H.R. McMaster's comments. I agree with him.

Relating this older article to the present is pretty easy. U.S. current actions in Ukraine demonstrate a similar lack of seriousness. It is unclear what we think we are doing when we get involved in war. If we aren't trying to win – to achieve a better future than the existing condition – then what are we fighting for? Why be involved in the war at all? Such a lack of seriousness lends support to the isolationist voices in the United States. I am not an isolationist, but I am adamantly opposed to wasting human life and American treasure through foolish and feckless endeavors that don't improve our interests or influence. In my opinion, such fecklessness does greater harm than would an isolationist policy.

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The National Military Strategy for 2017 will be classified to withhold information from the 4+1 threats and to address the five domains ("Four plus one" refers to four nation-states — Russia, China, Iran, and North Korea — plus the enduring but ever-mutating problem of Islamic extremism, once exemplified by al-Qaeda but now embodied by the so-called Islamic State, aka Daesh. The five domains are the land, sea, air, space, and cyberspace). The key point is the quote "Our traditional approach where we are either at peace or at war is insufficient to deal with that dynamic," Dunford said. The current reality is more "an adversarial competition with a military dimension short of armed conflict."

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This is a controversial article and one that may make readers uncomfortable. In recommending this article I am not stating agreement with its findings or the author's sourcing or arguments. I think that this brings to light critical questions about what sustained and repeated exposure to combat stress and horrific experiences can do to the human spirit in terms of moral behavior. I recommend that one read the book *With the Old Breed* by E.B. Sledge to understand that the behaviors discussed in this article are neither new for Americans nor as aberrational as some might wish to believe.

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This is a fascinating advocacy for resistance as a strategy for war and a way to develop a military.

- George W. Bush was the exception in that he sought to eliminate challenges rather than managing them.
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The author provides excellent insight for the problems of semantics in trying to communicate intent and effect.

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The author makes the following arguments: 1. Contemporary Russian political-military doctrine was on full display in 2016 US elections. 2. Effective disinformation campaign rebuts Clausewitz's trinity by severing the dialectic interrelationship between the government, the people and the military. 3. Postmodern warfare is multi-domain, borderless competition dominated by the ability of state and non-state actors to manipulate information through metanarratives to decisively overwhelm or undermine adversaries, focusing on non-

combatants for sources of internal and adversarial political dissidence. 4. The United States military urgently requires an innovation of military thought and a new theory that incorporates the dynamics of the postmodern environment.

This is an important article. It is a long one of about 10,000 words.

Like a related article, also from *The New York Times*, it is infuriating as well as excellent. I give my two points for being infuriating and a third point for why it is excellent. I address them in order of importance.

First, this article and others like it express something truly problematic in current conflict – Western (and particularly American) media refuse to acknowledge their role in generating, encouraging, directing, and shaping conflict. They like to act as if they are above the fray and somehow free of the responsibilities and ugliness of conflict, but they are, in many ways, more important than any other component of conflict as it exists as part of twenty-first century narrative war. Political and military leaders often feel propelled toward actions by media coverage of events. For example, Barack Obama would not have fought ISIS as he did without a media drumbeat to do so. The drumbeat for actions usually leads to removal of strictures and controls on those actions and those actions have consequences.

Second, war is hell. I have recently said this in another post, but it is true. WWII is often trumpeted as a *good war* or a noble crusade in part because the media hold up the Nazis as the worst villains ever. In 2014 and continuing to the present, ISIS is typically characterized as worse than Nazis. The media acts ignorant of what was done in fighting the Nazis. We firebombed cities. We indiscriminately killed millions of people. That was done because leaders justified their actions as necessary to defeat this enemy. Those labeling opponents Nazis or anything similar need to be aware of what that meant in the past and to what actions such labels may lead. By definition, in war people die, even innocent people. This is why initiating war must be a controlled and tightly governed affair. It is why the U.S. Congress must be involved because the people, as represented by that body must be in agreement to commit these atrocities in their name. If not, then don't go to war because you cannot wage war cleanly.

Third, the author does well to point out that the U.S. military has a learning problem. It does not seem to be able to adapt from one mistake such that it prevents the conduct of another. Part of the learning problem that the article illuminates is about confirmation bias. The U.S. military (and every other military with which I have worked) doesn't train people to understand the opponent, the partner, or the local populace. Therefore, decisions about insurgent or terrorist behavior should usually be suspect. This isn't a problem of rank of who gets to make the decision as generals aren't much better at understanding the opponent or local culture than are sergeants. Part of the problem with the technology is that it offers a siren song that the work needed to obtain such an understanding isn't necessary since the technology can see everything.

This is the kind of article that I love.

It makes me think and I want to argue with it. You can't ask for more than that.

I think that Joseph Stieb lays out a fair assessment of the competing views of the U.S. participation in the Global War on Terrorism (GWOT) and why understanding the various perspectives matter. For me, this article provides support to my point of the competing and conflicting narratives currently operating in America today. You see those in favor of and those opposed to global engagement and transformation on both sides of the political spectrum. In the context of this article, one might argue that there are four competing narratives in America when I have previously laid out only three (https://www.narrativespace.net/blog/narrative-war-on-american-streets-in-2020). The specific number of narratives isn't what matters. It matters that people are aware of and conversational with the variety of narratives such that they can recognize, comprehend, and oppose or agree with them as needed or desired.

Each of the narratives discussed as related to GWOT are important for the U.S.: believers in American supremacy, supporters of international order and institutions, isolationist nationalists, and critics of America's flaws. While we each may disagree on what the right percentage of each of these four groups might or should be for a healthy country, I hope that we recognize the value each group plays in a healthy American foreign policy. It is good to have the white knights seeking to slay dragons, the bleeding hearts that want to save the world, those who prefer to defend and protect the nation for its own sake while leaving other societies and cultures to themselves, and those who question and condemn the nation's flaws.

Each group plays an important and necessary part in generating healthy tension. While I may tire of lengthy rhetoric from any of these groups on a given day, when I reflect on the various roles they play I know that each has been useful in building the country that exists and that has provided the benefits that all American citizens enjoy today.

Paul Wolfowitz is a polarizing figure. Many people express extremes opinions regarding his statements and discount him as some sort of evil character. I think this is a mistake. I am not a fan of all the decisions he advocated, nor do I like the way that he regularly presents the catastrophes that have come from those recommendations. That said, he is intelligent, and he was in the room when a great many important decisions regarding the GWOT were made, and his recollections are worth serious consideration.

The biggest lesson that comes from this lengthy recollection is that the United States government, regardless of party, does not know how to do strategy. This is not the first time that I have come to realize this sad fact. Reading almost any memoir from GWOT leads to the same realization. The military recommends and the political appointees demand actions without a reasonable appreciation of cause and effect.

Strategy is, in part, about the management of cause and effect. A leader wants a desired effect and those who provide advice should be offering the logic path through which that effect can be accomplished. I know that strategy is much more complicated than cause and effect and is often more of an emergent phenomenon rather than an effect from a specific action. The point is, we don't really grasp the proper manner in which the desired effect happens and that leaves us with recommending actions.

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I disagree with Erik Prince, but he isn't wrong.

I know that a lot of people like to poke fun at and mock Erik Prince's ideas about the privatization of the American military with respect to the conduct of a variety of missions. I ask those people to hear me out on a couple of points.

One, I disagree with Erik Prince that economic efficiency and effectiveness should determine the way the U.S. goes about the conduct of national security actions. It may be cost-effective to pay private contractors to do advise and assist missions that require decades of commitment. I have worked with some of Erik Prince's folks in Iraq on more than one occasion and in other places in the Middle East as well. They are not the caricatures that Prince's critics paint them to be. They do their jobs well and accomplish their missions. My objection to Erik Prince's ideas is that the U.S. government and U.S. citizens and soldiers should shoulder the burdens of securing the republic because that is the right thing to do. Citizens need to sacrifice and suffer for their country or there won't be a country worth that sacrifice or suffering left.

Two, Erik Prince is correct when he says that there has been no accountability of the failures of the "national security "elites," both uniformed and civilian." This is what should really bother people about this article. The troubling aspects are where Prince is correct: wasteful spending, bad policy, ignorant efforts,

misunderstanding the operational environment, and a lack of accountability for any, some, or all of it. I want Erik Prince to be wrong all the way around, but I am starting to lose any semblance of faith that those in authority will face the world as it is and the problems as they are and design systems, educational and training programs, and leader development to mitigate and overcome the problems and failures that Prince is seeking to remedy with his recommendations.

A privatized national security system is bad for a republic. Citizens need to serve, need to study, and need to demand accountability of those who serve and study so that the republic is defended, interests are protected, and influence increased.

Executive Summary: Expert contributors agree that terrorism will remain a long-standing global threat. In addition, there is emphasis on the leadership of the USG as a whole of nation concept. The military alone cannot position parties against lasting terrorism threat but it certainly can shape and influence them through stability operations and other people centric maneuvering. It must work in close cooperation with other USG colleagues and coalition partners to do this while mitigating not only ISIL global impact, but other people and groups that strive to commit the devastating acts of violence. Further the USG should take deliberate measures to lessen underlying factors that lead parties to terror responses. Some specific ideas from this group of contributors include:

Executive Summary: This paper assesses the potential causes and effects of fragmentation on the Counter-ISIL coalition. This coalition consists of three distinct but interrelated subsets: 1) the CJTF-OIR coalition; 2) the regional coalition, de facto allies of convenience, who may provide any combination of money, forces or proxies; and, 3) the tactical coalition, the plethora of disparate groups fighting on the ground. The study team assessed how a change in either the CJTF-OIR coalition or regional coalition could influence the tactical coalition post Mosul and the subsequent effect of these potential fragmentations on the Gol's ability to control Iraq.

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## **The White House**

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"... three priority areas that demand our collective efforts: first, ensuring the non-proliferation of weapons of mass destruction and deterring their use; second, defeating jihadist terrorist organizations; and third, strengthening the international foundations for peace and prosperity."

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Two key quotes are:

"... unless we work together to defeat the ideas that drive different communities in a country like Iraq into conflict, any order that our militaries can impose will be temporary."

"The strongmen of today become the spark of revolution tomorrow. You can jail your opponents, but you can't imprison ideas. You can try to control access to information, but you cannot turn a lie into truth."

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This is an interesting discussion of H.R. McMaster's book now that he has a position of significance in the White House. The analysis is decent, but it misses the point that he researched and wrote the book when he was a captain. Obviously, it is going to be simplistic at that point in his career.

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## **Operation Enduring Freedom (Afghanistan)**

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Hubris and Mendacity

These are John Sopko's two words for why things went so poorly in Afghanistan. I always recommend reading his own words as captured in his quarterly report to Congress. For those of you without the time for 214 pages, then I recommend a brief summation of his remarks to defense writers captured by Jeff Schogol (<u>https://taskandpurpose.com/news/afghanistan-reconstruction-failures-special-inspector-general/</u>) where the above two word summation is included.

Special Inspector General for Afghanistan Reconstruction, "What We Need to Learn: Lessons from Twenty Years of Afghanistan Reconstruction" [August 2021].

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The SIGAR identifies seven key lessons from the twenty years of U.S. operations in Afghanistan.

- 1. Strategy: The U.S. government continuously struggled to develop and implement a coherent strategy for what it hoped to achieve.
- Timelines: The U.S. government consistently underestimated the amount of time required to rebuild Afghanistan, and created unrealistic timelines and expectations that prioritized spending quickly. These choices increased corruption and reduced the effectiveness of programs.
- 3. Sustainability: Many of the institutions and infrastructure projects the United States built were not sustainable.
- 4. Personnel: Counterproductive civilian and military personnel policies and practices thwarted the effort.
- 5. Insecurity: Persistent insecurity severely undermined reconstruction efforts.

- 6. Context: The U.S. government did not understand the Afghan context and therefore failed to tailor its efforts accordingly.
- 7. Monitoring and Evaluation: U.S. government agencies rarely conducted sufficient monitoring and evaluation to understand the impact of their efforts.

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This is good reading and should be mandatory for every military and national security professional across the globe. It provides a sad, but well-written account of how the richest and most powerful military force in the world can be defeated by \_\_\_\_\_\_ (you fill in the blank, because I don't think the Taliban are the only ones who have or will exploit these weaknesses). In short, the answer is by our own incompetence, poor leadership, and mismanagement.

John Sopko has been a real American hero throughout the last years of U.S. involvement in Afghanistan. As the Special Inspector General for Afghanistan Reconstruction, his reports have provided the best information on U.S. mismanagement and misunderstanding of the operational environment and the conduct of building a partner force in Afghanistan.

His organization's reports are clear, interesting, and, at times, entertaining. The latest report provides similar clear-worded critique and assessment for why things happened as they did in 2021. The report, titled "Collapse of the Afghan National Defense and Security Forces: An Assessment of the Factors That Led to Its Demise," identifies six factors that accelerated the Afghan military's collapse and nine factors for why the Afghan military was poorly prepared for the departure of U.S. military forces and contractors. Read, enjoy, and I hope, learn.

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A powerful read about the manner in which the Taliban gained and are maintaining power. This reminds me a lot of the way that ISIS came to power through engagements that attacked the corruption in the national

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I disagree with the pro-Ghani tone of the article, but I think that the author captures some important truths in what he expresses. Point one, Ashraf Ghani was not the far-seeing visionary that he is portrayed as. Point two, the Doha agreement was flawed in its appreciation of Afghanistan and the causes and effects of the fighting there. Point three, U.S. representative to the Doha talks, Zalmay Khalilzad, needs to be held accountable for his flawed advice and actions in the name of the United States of America and every senior leader who allowed him to act on behalf of the U.S. while being an independent citizen also needs to be held accountable.

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This is an article I just read even though it is more than a year old. If you haven't already read it, it is worth your time as we reflect on the events of two years ago that occurred in Afghanistan.

The worst and best part of the information is this quote: "Alizai doesn't believe that U.S. intelligence agencies were all that surprised by the rapid Afghan military meltdown.

"I think they pretend to be surprised," he said. "But for us, it was a surprise why they are surprised."

I am a fan of Tony Cordesman's work over the decades that I have been reading it. This is not for everyone for three reasons. One, the work is long (63 pages, although there are a lot of graphs). Two, there are a lot of wonkish terms and phrases that might lose many readers. Three, this is an unfinished project that basically lays out what a proper and thoughtful history of the war in Afghanistan needs to include to provide the necessary material for a full and complete understanding of what happened and why.

In both Iraq and Afghanistan there were two wars. In Afghanistan they were a war against al-Qaeda and their "state" sponsored supporters and a counterinsurgency against the Taliban seeking to fight the invader and occupier and regain their position of authority. The US won the first war (as it also did in Iraq), but struggled and lost the second war. Cordesman gives some insight and raises a lot of questions about how that second failure occurred.

This is a long read, but it contains a lot of good material. Tony Cordesman asks some excellent questions at the end, but throughout the paper, he suggests area and ways that the U.S. could have done better. I will highlight a few in my own words:

- Realistic objectives and appreciation of the environment
- Better accounting and accountability of aid and assistance
- Proper timing of effort. He asserts that the U.S. didn't provide security forces fast enough when there was a small threat and then once the Taliban was a threat the effort was too slow to respond
- Insufficient transparency from military, government, and development leadership

Sohrab was a great student and a powerful combat leader for his country. He was the kind of man Afghanistan needs to hold off Taliban advances. That was his job, in fact, to retake villages and towns that had been attacked or taken by the Taliban. I am angry for reasons that I have expressed many times in this forum - the ignorance of the non-Afghans involved in leading, fighting, and reporting on the war in Afghanistan. It is as if no one understood/understands what Afghanistan was/is and no one understood/understands the purposes for fighting in Afghanistan. I understand that this anger is somewhat misplaced as there are many who do understand and know, but the unfortunate reality is that they are almost never the ones in charge or from whom we hear about the events there (if we hear anything at all).

This article and video capture the nature of the Taliban and just some of the ignorance of reporters in understanding the character of the war there.

The story of Afghanistan is a story of maddening ignorance. In *Abandoning Vietnam: How America Left and South Vietnam Lost Its War*, Jim Willbanks argues that one of the reasons that South Vietnam fell was because the U.S. military and government made the South Vietnamese military look like the U.S. military. By doing that, the South Vietnamese military required the same access to resources as did the U.S. military which were not available in 1974 and 1975. Here we are more than 45 years after the collapse of South Vietnam and 17 years after Willbanks published his book and this one mistake from Vietnam is being played out again as we watch the Afghan National Army struggle against the Taliban.

If this were the only mistake then what is happening in Afghanistan wouldn't be quite so sad. This article fails

to identify what most Americans, in general, and most military professionals, more specifically do not know about Afghanistan in 1996: how fast the Taliban captured that country. The Taliban attacked with lightening raids that took villages, towns, and cities faster than their opponents could recover or regroup. It looks like the Taliban have not forgotten their own history – they seem to be trying to experience again the benefits of 25 years ago.

When the Taliban defeated their opponents in the mid-1990s, their opponents often just pulled back to their defensible tribal areas. The Taliban never controlled all of Afghanistan. It is possible that everyone may try to relive some form of that earlier success or failure.

This is depressing and poignant. It is also long, but I strongly recommend this. This is further support for what I have been writing about narrative war over the past weeks, months, and years. In this article the author Anand Gopal, who also wrote one of the more interesting books on the Afghanistan War, describes the dynamics of the American war in Afghanistan in the countryside and small villages.

Even though this was something that I expected, it was still a shockingly disappointing reminder of how little the Americans understood Afghanistan and its relatively recent history. As you read it you will see the difficulty in what it means to bring stability to an unstable country. Often it means that the occupier seeks to stabilize quickly which means turning to those who produce short term results – often war lords – as was the case in Afghanistan.

Malkasian lived and worked in Afghanistan and he did so in a district center away from Kabul. I give him the nod in expressing the 'on the ground' perspective of the war.

Of course, the book will be a Greek tragedy as the story of Afghanistan is one of hubristic ignorance, but I have already said enough on that topic.

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Critical point. When no one is watching then no one cares and anything can happen.

This is a sad point about modern American connections to military intervention. We teach military officers that the all-volunteer force was a good thing for the US Army. That was true, in a way. I have come to believe that it was bad for the country. Effectively, the US military is like the local fire department. No one thinks about it unless their neighbor's house is on fire. No one cares if the fire department is properly trained or equipped. That is because everyone assumes that that is what their taxes are for.

The US military has become a global fire department. Since that means that it fights fires distant from US shores then most US citizens don't care. It doesn't affect them. Their sons and daughters are not at risk. Effectively, the military is becoming a family business with multiple generations serving and more couples where both spouses are in uniform.

This isn't good for the republic. The citizenry needs to have skin in the game or they won't care what is done in their name thousands of miles from their homes. And, why should they. I don't ask the city council about the fire department.

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I strongly disagree with this author's recommendation and interpretation of the war; however, I have met and spoken with enough military and government personnel who agree with this interpretation of events to recognize that it has some value. For me, the value comes from recognizing the argument and more clearly seeing where and why I disagree.

Every year I ask my students to evaluate past US wars on whether or not they were a win or a loss and then to assess to what degree the war was one or the other. This is a wonderful exercise in communicating the "Princess Bride" problem that exists in the US military with the use of the word win: "I do not think it means what you think it means." For the most part, the officers may agree on whether or not we won WWII, but they don't agree on the degree to which that war was a win. This will certainly be a future blog post, but the point for now is that the word win has lost almost all meaning and this article expresses why this is true.

If winning is the accomplishment of objectives that you determine then this can and often does lead to a sort of circular logic. We set objectives that we could achieve, we achieved them, and therefore we won. By such logic, we won in Vietnam because we won every battle (I recognize that this is disputed) and one could go on to define every military engagement as a win by such a perspective. I will save for the blog post my definition of winning, but here I want to express that it must have an objective meaning or it will become meaningless, like so many other words in the present environment and that would be a tragedy.

Discouraging, but not unexpected. The number one question all Americans involved with national security should be asking themselves is why after nearly 20 years of fighting is the Taliban close to being the dominant power in Afghanistan. How is this possible?

As a supporting work to answer this question, I recommend Carter Malkasian's book, War Comes to Garmser. This book does the best job of explaining why the Taliban were effective in governing Afghanistan and why the governments that have ruled the country since 2002 have not been effective. I recommend it to my students every year as a must-read book.

The US military never understood Afghanistan and I would argue that we never tried to at an institutional level. One of the things that makes teaching at the Command and General Staff College useful is that it represents where the army's institutional mind is focused. At no time, over the last 20 years, has there been a mandatory block of instruction in this institution on Afghanistan: its history, people, culture, etc. If we are going to invade a country, I would recommend that we ought to focus our institutional mind on understanding that country.

I was aware of this article when it was published, but I haven't read it until now. I am glad for that. I would have been too angry to have finished it two months back as I relived the events of a year prior and my frustrations with those events. I have never been a fan of General (retired) Petraeus, but I also recognize him to have been the most capable and politically savvy general that the U.S. had leading the wars in the Global War on Terrorism.

In his year after reflection, he offers three observations of American failures that resulted in the overall disastrous ending. I list them with a combination of paraphrase and rewording:

- 1. lack of strategic resolve
- 2. unwillingness to commit the resources required and to allocate properly the resources that existed
- 3. failure to understand the operational environment

I agree with each of these three as failures and because of how broad they are, I believe they encompass the breadth of U.S. incompetence in Afghanistan.

The problem with the statement (as that is what it is more than an article) is that General Petraeus doesn't explain how to prevent these problems from recurring in future conflict environments. Regardless of what you think about the leaders of the U.S. effort in Afghanistan, none of them was stupid. They were all intelligent people. If these intelligent people failed to do what amounts to very basic things – things that we teach majors about regularly and often at the various service staff colleges – then what hope is there that the U.S. system for fighting and managing conflict can correct it in the future?

I want to offer three suggestions as a list and hope to develop them more in some future forum.

- Educate officers on what it means to understand the operational environment in its necessary detail. I
  know that the U.S. military thinks that it does this, but I would offer that we clearly don't, or we wouldn't
  have had so many senior leaders admit after the fact that they didn't know the Afghanistan operating
  environment well enough.
- 2. Force officers and soldiers to function in an austere training environment. Purposefully do not give soldiers, students, and leaders enough of what they need to do their jobs in the academic, training, and combat training center environments. Grade them and hold them accountable for their performance in this resource constrained environment. Make our soldiers learn, fight, and win with less. Resource constraint often leads to creative solutions. Maybe we can hack the system and force ourselves to be creative as well.
- 3. Provide more experience in and with foreign militaries. Most U.S. soldiers and leaders do not know other ways to do a task. They are taught and they typically only experience the U.S. way and that causes them to believe that this is not just the right way, but the only way. Obviously, such thinking is incorrect, but also reasonable and understandable. We need to break people out of their one perspective world.

I know that recommendations two and three are different and weird and would require creative and unusual approaches to provide the environments and opportunities, but I think that absent such efforts, we will not develop the creative solutions to the problems presented by General Petraeus' thoughtful statement.

An interesting twist on how the Taliban won. This challenges the notion of the Taliban as stone age warriors which was always inaccurate. Note that ISIS was probably the most adept social media opponent that the U.S. has yet fought, and they laid claim to seventh century interpretations of sharia. It shouldn't surprise anyone that the Taliban will use and have used the most advanced equipment that they can access.

The Taliban, al-Qaeda, and ISIS are not the Amish. They have no problems with modern technology in ANY form. It should not surprise any reader of this that now and in the future any group that seeks to return to earlier interpretations of an ideology will not be limited to the technology of that same earlier period. That will hold true whether those ideologies are secular communism or religious Islamism.

Also, do not accept an argument that this was a one trick pony for success. The Taliban didn't win because they used a drone or many drones any more than ISIS was successful because they used Twitter, Facebook, and YouTube. The drone was one tool in a larger toolbox. What is notable is that this is the first article of which I am aware to explain the use of this tool.

This is a compelling refutation of the concept that the U.S. was universally loved by the average Afghan. I have written and spoken a great deal about narrative war and in that type of conflict the goal of an opposing actor is to increase the dissonance between the American story and the societal narrative. This article provides excellent support for the notion that the U.S. did a lot to generate its own dissonance and that the Taliban needed to only act upon that dissonance and then interpose its story between the American story and the Afghan people's narrative. This is what the Taliban did. Afghanistan is as powerful an example of successful narrative war as there has yet been. I thought that ISIS was the best example, but I was wrong.

It is important to acknowledge that these are things said after the Taliban are in control. Not everything should be taken as 100% honest and valid. That said, there is certainly truth in what is being said. How much, is the question.

It is unfortunate how politicized everything is. The idea that the US military has not been fighting to win for some time in Afghanistan shouldn't be a political statement. It is true.

It is also unfortunately necessary for me to say that this assertion is not intended to denigrate the personal and familial sacrifices of hundreds of thousands of military and contractor personnel.

What does it take to fight to win? It means that the organization is willing to do what it takes to win. That may mean changing how it rotates units or how it partners or how it does any of the hundreds or thousands of tasks essential to modern conflict. For example, the US military never seriously contemplated leaving units in theater until winning was accomplished.

Think about how much adaptation would have happened if that was the decision. Junior leaders would have found a way. That is part of what it means to fight to win.

Conflict is not a rotational business. It is a business of adaptation. That adaptation comes from friction between opposing parties.

Simply stated, this is the best explanation of what happened to the Afghan National Army. It is a little late to the discussion and many of you may have already seen or read it. If you have, read it again. This is profound.

What many don't seem to understand is the meaning of a tipping point with respect to human will or commitment. Human beings will do and endure incredible things. I tell my students that there is no environment that a human cannot endure. We regularly underestimate human resilience. However, one must understand that human resilience is directly connected to necessity. If it isn't a requirement then humans won't endure as much as we expect. Under an environment of suffering by choice it becomes an exercise in understanding what will break human resolve.

I have previously and will again recommend Jim Willbanks' book, *Abandoning Vietnam*, as an analog for what we have witnessed over the last twelve to eighteen months in Afghanistan. The contention made by Willbanks was that the U.S. failed South Vietnam by negotiating a deal that involved the withdrawal of U.S. forces without a similar withdrawal of North Vietnamese forces from South Vietnam. Secondly, the U.S. made the mistake of making the South Vietnamese military look like the U.S. military which meant that it needed to be logistically supported like the U.S. military which South Vietnam was not independently capable of doing. Both of these problems were also present in Afghanistan. An additional point that comes out in this opinion

piece is the emphasis on the importance of U.S. contractors for the success of the Afghan National Army. There were 5 to 7 times as many U.S. contractors in Afghanistan as there were combat forces at the end and those contractors were 5 to 7 times more important for the Afghan National Army to fight independent of U.S. combat power, but without U.S. combat power those contractors could not and would not remain.

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This is the best summary of the "extremist" players in Afghanistan so far.

I would refer everyone to the battle for Stalingrad in WWII as a possible useful comparison. When reserves showed up, the Soviets opted to attack the surrounding German units rather than the Germans in Stalingrad.

The idea being to separate the German Sixth Army from any possible relief.

With extremist groups, they likewise attack those most closely sharing their ideology to create separation between themselves and their ultimate opponents. In this case, the Taliban want to present the West with the option of either supporting it or supporting ISIS knowing that the West will choose the Taliban given those options.

ISIS, on the other hand, wants to attack and discredit anyone else's bone fides as purely Islam and by so doing offer fighters and the population a choice between Islam and corruption.

This brief article lays out well the available options over which this ideological competition exists.

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This is a fascinating story about the location of Mullah Omar in Afghanistan until his death during the US occupation. The points the story emphasizes include the following:

- Mullah Omar never left the area
- The local and simple people supported him throughout the occupation
- The locals rejected American occupation

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The article is part of a series that discusses the final months of the Trump presidency following the election and leading to the inauguration. The focus of this episode is on Trump's desire to withdraw the US military from multiple locations globally and the efforts exerted by senior military and civilian members of the Department of Defense to prevent that effort.

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This assessment gives an interesting take on the events in Iraq following the US withdrawal from the country.

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This is not stunning, but it is sad, and it communicates what was possible with actual leadership from political and military leaders vis-à-vis the American people.

The United States Institute for Peace Afghanistan Study Group released its recent Congressionally mandated report on what to do about Afghanistan with respect to a looming 1 May 2021 departure date. The report is interesting for the obvious recommendations beginning with having a strategy. Stephen Walt writes an excellent summation of the problems with the report. There are no recommendations from Walt to fix the report. His primary recommendation is to leave Afghanistan. Given the realities of twenty years of failure and continued American institutional ignorance with respect to the complexities of Afghanistan, I agree.

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In narrative war we have seen things turn very rapidly. It is the nature of narrative war that once the conditions are set then it is possible for a weak power to suddenly be on top as we saw in 2014 in Syria and Iraq and in 1996 and 2021 in Afghanistan. This article expresses perceptions that can cause such a flip in relationships. I will address more about Afghanistan as an example of narrative war in action in an upcoming blog post, but for now I ask that you consider this as a critical moment in the story that is being created – American incompetence.

For those who have said that we need to avoid rapid judgments, I agree with you. My point isn't to say that the sky is falling, but to say that this is how the sky falls and that we have to be very careful to keep the sky from actually falling.

I hope that that made sense.

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You need to read this. This is a long article with more than 6,000 words. The subtitle is not shocking. Almost everyone I know with any knowledge of Afghanistan knew that the rosy assessments and predictions were completely fabricated. The notion that this is another *Pentagon Papers* is absolute garbage. There is nothing new here, however, this is a solid summary of the falsehoods and misperceptions about what was (and is) happening in Afghanistan.

I suggest that this article is as much an indictment of the Congress and the media as it is of the military senior

leadership. This does indict the military senior civilians and generals, but where were those responsible for oversight and where were the reporters? Why didn't they go to Afghanistan, see for themselves, and ask hard questions?

I fear that this article exposes the fundamental flaw of an all-volunteer military. The nation leaves it to "the professionals" to deal with the problem and no one else bothers. No one else is qualified to question "the professionals" and "the professionals" are not really qualified to build a nation they don't understand. Before we can fix Afghanistan, we need to fix this problem.

An excellent source for insight into Iraq pre-2003. Saddam Hussein ruled Iraq by controlling the narrative space. Specifically, he controlled religious instruction and discourse through decades of manipulation, coercion, and intimidation. Failure to understand the effort required to control the religious landscape ensured ignorant decisions by occupying powers. It is also fair to suggest that even if US administrators had understood, the very fabric of the US civil-religious discourse would have prevented any American-led occupation from controlling the explosion of religious sectarianism with the necessary force.

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This is a passionate discussion of the tragedy that is modern Iraq. All those who advocate intervention in another country should read this or material like this before they continue such advocacy.

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As one who went through these times in Baghdad and watched the process develop this article captures some of the truths of the decisions and actions taken. It completely misses the lack of energy on the part of the administration to actually influence the Iraqi government. It also fails to address the institutional weakness of the department of State regarding planning which was, in part, a reason for the escalated cost estimates.

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Samuel Helfont has written some of the most interesting scholarship on the Saddam Hussein regime and he is worth reading and considering regardless of whether or not you agree with him. In fact, if you do disagree with him, all the better to ponder over his thinking. I happen to agree with him in this article and I strongly recommend it for consideration.

The executive summary includes the following findings:

- VNSAs are more likely to kill many civilians in one year when they control territory and when governments use violence, or what we call a stick strategy, against them;
- VNSAs are most likely to kill many civilians in one year when governments use a mixed strategy that is, a combination of violence (stick) and negotiation (what we term a carrot strategy) as opposed to either stick or carrot alone;
- VNSAs are most likely to inflict more than 100 battle deaths in one year when they control territory, are highly connected to other VNSAs, and are large (though there is a strong relationship between size and controlling territory);
- VNSAs are less likely to inflict more than 100 battle deaths in one year when they have a formal political party.
- VNSAs that are socially isolated that is, have no alliance connections tend to be less lethal and tend to stay relatively less lethal;
- Social isolation is a relatively stable state; however, there are factors that help to drive organization alliance formation like shared location, ideology, and preference for closed relationship – a friend of friend tends also to be a friend;
- Once an organization generates alliance connections, a feedback loop drives lethality up;
- Maintaining organizational isolation appears to be a useful strategy for dampening organizational lethality from the abstract. "We come with two main conclusions.

Reviewing these findings which are derived from statistically available information from 1998-2012 one can see why a group like ISIS would be expected to be violent and even excessively so.

It is this question that we need to consider.

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Robots killing humans should be avoided. One can make both a utilitarian and ethical argument for this statement. I would suggest that if a society believes that a given conflict is not worth risking the lives of their sons and daughters then that conflict should not be waged. War is being made too easy and with too few consequences for technologically advanced countries. War or conflict should cause deep and difficult conversations. The state sponsored taking of human life must force painful reflection and legal and moral judgments. Otherwise we will become like the Skynet security system in the Terminator movie franchise – a killing machine fulfilling basic logic calculations and exacting the coldly analyzed and reasoned solutions.

And it's been our tradition since we were tied to the ground to translate that into terms of ground objectives, but that was never the real purpose. That would just help you achieve the end. Here we can free ourselves of those ground considerations and we go more directly for the enemy wherever he may be.
